But when a long Train of Abules and Ufurpations, purfuing ins insub-te fame Object, evinces a Delign to reduce them under abfolute Defpotifm, it is their right, it is their Duty, to throw off fuch Governmenn, and to provide new Guards for the rother Security. He is, at this Time, transporting large Armies of foreign Mercenaries to complete the Works of Death, Defolation, and Tyranny, already begun with Circumstances of Crucity and Perfdy, foracely paralleled in the most barbarous Ages, and totally unworthy the Head of a civilized Nation.

He has confizined our Fellow Citizens, taken Captive on the high Seas, to bear Arms againft their Country, to become the Executioners of their Friends and Brethren, or to fail themlelves by their Hands. He has excited domefic Infurrections amongft us, and has endeavoured to bring on the Inhabitants of our Frontiers, the mercile's Indian Savages, whole known Rule of Warfare, is an undiftinguifhed Deftruction, of all Ages, Sexes, and Conditions. In every Stage of thefe Opprefilons we have Petitioned for Redrefs in the moth humble Terms: Our repeated Petitions have been an uncered only by repeated Injury. We have eminded them of the Circumfances of our Emigration and Settlement here. We have appealed to their native Juffice and Magnasimity, and we have conjured them by the Ties of our common Kindred to didavow thefe Ultrpati-ons, which would inevitably interrupt our Connexions and Correspondence. They too have been deaf to the Voice of Juffice and of Coalanguinity. We muft, therefore, ac-quiefer in the Necefity, which denounces our Separation, and hold them, as we hold the keef of Mankind, Enemies in War, in Peace Friends. We, therefore, the Reprefeatatives of the UNITED STATES or AMERICA, in GENERAL CONGRESS Affembled, appealing to the Supreme Judge of the World for the Rectitude of our Intentions, do, in the Name, and by Authority of the good People of these (Johnes, Iohem) Publifi and Declare. That thefe United Colonies are, and of Right ought to be, FREE AND INDEPENDENT STATES; that they are abforded from all Allegiance to the Brith Crown, and that all Political Connexion be-tween them and the State of Great-Britain, is, and ought to be, totally diffolved; and that as FREE AND INDEPENDENT STATES, they have full Power to levy War, conclude Peace, contract Alliances, effablifi Commerce, and to do all tother Acts and a Things which INDEPENDENT STATES may of Right do. And for the Support of this Declaration, with a firm Reliance on the Protection of UVINE PROVIDENCE, we mutually pledge to each other our Lives, our Forumer, and our faced Honowr.
